ADVANCED	You're an experienced and knowledgeable user of the language, with A` Level / you completed Intermediate level previously.	You can use a range of sentence types, tenses, and varied vocabulary reasonably fluently. You may be short of writing practice.
PROFICIENCY	You're a very experienced and knowledgeable user of the language. You have done Advanced level work already.	You can communicate in most situations, working towards more fluent communication and confidence in all skills.
MASTERY	You already have near- native competence and may have completed Proficiency level previously.	You can already communicate in any situation. You're working towards an educated, native-like ability in all skills, including formal writing.
