

Introduction

2 Many people feel drawn towards building intimate relationships that include mutual arrangements on emotional and/or sexual non-exclusivity. This event will explore questions regarding consensually non-monogamous ways of life, from academic, cultural and political perspectives. Consensual non-monogamy can be based on many different styles of intimacy, including (among others): open relationships (build around a primary couple), negotiated loving multi-partner relationships (often called polyamory) or approaches that refuse to make any distinction between sexual, romantic or platonic relationships (referred to by some as 'relationship anarchy').

This event brings together leading researchers, activists and community organizers to stage a discussion around relationship diversity, exclusion, visibility, relationship ethics and the practical challenges of living in non-monogamous or polyamorous relationships and families. The day will consist of a series of brief talks and discussions, an information fair with stalls and a 'human library' of people who are

ready to answer your questions about what 'poly' means to them personally.

Non/monogamies: What Does a Queer Relationship Look Like?

In this talk I present a recent zine project where I try to bring together academic work on openly non-monogamous relationships, and queer theory/activism, to produce a collection of questions that queer and openly non-monogamous people might engage with when exploring their own relationships. This is an example of my wider activist-academic approach which combines

critical engagement with wider culture, collaboration with activists and communities, and creative development of (anti-)self-help style materials, in an ongoing dynamic process. The zine takes different understandings of the word 'queer' as a starting point: queer meaning strange; queer meaning gay; queer meaning identities/practices outside (hetero)normativity; and queer meaning questioning fixed identities and either/or binaries. For each understanding the zine considers the potential implications for relationships, particularly how this relates to non/monogamous styles of relating. There's a particularly focus on the recent proliferation of relationships identities and practices, and the potential present in considering how people do relationships, exploring relationships on multiple dimensions, and questioning the lines drawn between different categories of relationships.

"Well, first you became a lesbian, then you're into this pervy kinky stuff and well I mean then there is really no necessity to get married, right?" - Non-monogamies in les-bi-trans-queer BDSM communities

In my talk I will present some results from my qualitative empirical study for which I conducted in-depth interviews with 50 les-bi-trans-queer BDSM practitioners from Western Europe and the US. In the les-bi-trans-queer BDSM community, as is reflected in my own sample, the norm of monogamy seems to be reversed and various non-monogamous relationship styles and practices are the expected standard behaviour, especially at community events such as play parties. I will analyse the reasons for this community-specific preference for non-monogamy, and take a look at how some elements of mono-normativity are questioned and some are re-instated in the interviews simultaneously. Furthermore I will introduce some BDSM-specific kinds of relationships and intimacies such as the fulltime ownership relationship, the leather family and sharing intimacy in play party spaces. Some of the BDSM approaches to non-monogamy and polyamory may conflict in interesting ways with some of the tenets of the polyamory community. This may provide a starting point to discuss the role power, negotiating, and collectivity play in sexual and intimate relationships. I utilize the concept of

exuberance as a queer philosophy of excess and abundance, to describe les-bi-trans-queer BDSM (non-monogamous) intimacies and ways of relating.

Polyaffectivity: Challenging Monogamy's Logic of Lack

Mainstream culture frequently associates non-monogamy—even consensual non-monogamy and polyamory—with lack, scarcity, and loss: Non-monogamous desire is said to be an outcome of an unfulfilling couple relationship or of one's inability to make a true commitment. Additionally, people who live non-monogamously are accused of taking away from one partner what they give to their other one(s), be it in terms of emotional exclusivity, intimacy, or time. This logic of lack is linked to a container model of affection, conceiving of needs as pre-punched holes longing to be stuffed and supposing love and care to be scarce goods that can only be sufficient for one beloved person (at the same time). As I would like to discuss in my talk, the rhetoric of lack is a key element of mono-normativity, the socially privileged status of exclusive couple relationships. Drawing on my empirical research, I will show that in some cases notions of shortage and replenishment are assumed by people who have opted for open or poly relationships. However, ethical non-monogamies also offer a variety of

contrary conceptions and experiences which challenge mono-normativity by pointing to the productive, exuberant, and transformative power of affects and desire.
