A Festival to Grow Up With...

When I became Poet Laureate in 2009, I asked my colleagues at Manchester

Metropolitan University to help me create a festival for the city that would celebrate children's books. We were soon joined by partner organisations from across Manchester, including most of the museums, galleries, libraries, theatres and other festivals. Working together, we are pleased to present our sixth programme of activity: the 2017 Manchester Children's Book Festival.

Our biggest event each year is our Family Fun Day, which brings all of our cultural partners to Manchester Met for a Saturday of celebration and fun. There will be lots of things to do, with readings, performances, workshops, arts and crafts, music, sports, food and, of course, poetry. And there will also be plenty for teens and young adults to do in the Generation Manchester and Science Zone.

Our Fun Day had 3,500 visitors last year. It's free to attend and everyone is welcome. With the support of publishers and our city partners, we work all year round in schools, libraries and local communities providing inspiring projects and opportunities for creative expression. More than 40,000 people have taken part in our activities – and for many this has been their first time attending a literary event. Our competitions and digital projects have also allowed people from across the wider world to participate and have their say. We want as many people as possible to be able to access our festival and so most of our events are free to attend. So much has come from our MCBF partnership with the city, not least the development of the Manchester Creative Learning Network, which helps to communicate the city's cultural offer to schools. 2017 is the year of Read Manchester, a collaboration between the National Literacy Trust and Manchester City Council – we are delighted to be part of this initiative.

I am proud of what the Manchester Children's Book Festival has achieved and that we are able to provide the children of our city with these ongoing opportunities to develop a love of literature and express themselves creatively. I hope you enjoy this year's Manchester Children's Book Festival and that you will continue to grow with us for years to come.

Read for Good books and storytelling for children in hospital

MCBF supports many charities but our official adopted charity is Read for Good. With your help, we will continue to replenish two bookcases at the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital with brand new books every six weeks in addition to providing regular visits from a professional storyteller to help the children explore into their own imagination.

Read Manchester

Manchester Children's Book Festival is proud to support the Read Manchester campaign. Read Manchester is a collaboration between Manchester City Council and the National Literacy Trust, which promotes reading and aims to boost literacy levels across the city.

MCBF has been out at Manchester schools over the past few months with Katie, researching her forthcoming book *Dear Katie*, which we will tour schools with in September.

The Book Benches have been decorated by various schools and community groups and have been inspired by novels, comics and poems. 

FREE Bus Service from Longsight
